There were these lifts in The Eaton Center. I believe these are OTIS, but I'm not quite sure.



Trip to Toruń, November 12, 2018

Toruń ['torun] (German: Thorn) is a city in northern Poland, on the Vistula River. Its population was 202,591 as of June 2016. Previously it was the capital of the Toruń Voivodeship (1975–98) and the Pomeranian Voivodeship (1921–45). Since 1999, Toruń has been a seat of the self-government of the Kuyavian-Pomeranian Voivodeship and, as such, is one of its two capitals (together with Bydgoszcz). The cities and neighboring counties form the Bydgoszcz–Toruń twin city metropolitan area.















Sjenjak - The BEST part of Osijek





Trains in Slovenia



So today, i will show you a bit of train public transport in Slovenia. We have electrified (3 kV DC system) and non-electrified lines. On the electrified lines the trains used for public transport are Siemens Desiro, 3 Pendolinos and only 3 EN 57 class trains left, so its good to know when you can get on them, i will show you on which routes you can ride them. On non-electrified lines there are 3 different variants of DMUs, series 711, 713/715 and 813/814. Theres also a lot of passenger rail wagons in Slovenia.

EMUs



Siemens Desiro, made between 2000 and 2002. There are 30 of them. If you go on electrified lines, most of the time you will get on one of these. Especially on summer, when only these drive. Photo of interior, whose windows were graffited from outside.





EN 57 or Gomulka in Slovenia, they are the most interesting trains in Slovenia and they have lots of character, but there are only 3 left, and they are going to be replaced next year, so if you want to see them, there are about 3 months left.. Seats are comfy and cool looking.





Pendolino ETR 460 made in 2000 by Fiat Ferroviaria, is on IntercitySlovenia route, and you need to pay some extra for it.



DMUs



This one is series 711, they came here in 1970.

This train is going to be replaced next year by Stadlers. As some of them have been scraped already.





This is series 713/715. If you come to Ljubljana railway station, there will be mostly those DMUs, other two are more on local level.





This train is series 813/814 made between 1973-76. Made by Fiat. They look really awesome, i love seeing them. Sadly a lot of them were modernised, and now look similiar to 713/715. So these unmodernised will get replaced after Stadlers come.

If you want to see awesome diesel train 813/814, you need to go on local routes: Jesenice–Nova Gorica–Sežana, Celje–Velenje, Grobelno–Rogatec, Stranje–Imeno and Maribor–Prevalje, but there is still possiblity there will not be any of them.

First timetable is for Ljubljana-Kranj i cropped it so there is more space (EN 57 here LP2232, LP2412, LP2416). Next timetable is for Kranj-Ljubljana. EN57 here (LPV2443, LP2405, LP2451). There is also one train that goes to Litija and back to Ljubljana. From Ljubljana 12:20 and from Litija to Ljubljana 13:02.



Located between the Jamaica Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, this small stretch of land, in my opinion, is a great place to view planes taking off and landing at New York's John F. This month I went to Berlin. I found loads of epic lifts around Mariendorfer Damm and Wilmersdorfer Damm. I also found awesome lifts around Coswiger Straße, like an original 1979 East-German lift. The oldest original lift I found was an epic Schindler from 1968. But I also found another Schindler Direct Drive. It was the light blue variant, which I've never seen before. The lifts at Ullsteinhaus look absolutely epic. There is even a publicly accessible innerdoorless lift there, which is extremely rare in Germany.

As always, I enjoyed the sound of the S-Bahn and U-Bahn trains.

I have done loads this month. I have been to Krakow in Poland, Kyiv in Ukraine, and Casablanca in Morocco.

I have just got back from going around places in the North of England including Sheffield, Blackpool and Lancaster.



The tram train system in Sheffield was very disappointing. A 10 year wait of loads of hype and talking about it, and the extension only has 2 stations. It also has loads of badly designed junctions which are painfully slow.





I went on the very first Ryanair flight to Kyiv from London Stansted. Sadly the flight was no different to any other Ryanair flight.

Below: The boards at Kyiv central station are different to your usual station. Instead of showing upcoming departures, it shows a list of all daily departures. This is confusing until you are used to it!

The listing from left to right as follows..... Arrival time (if Kyiv is not the starting station), departure time, train ID, start and end stations of train, most important station on route, the arrival & departure time of important station, arrival time at final station, which days of the week does it run.





Type E, the oldest type of train on the Kyiv metro. These trains are epic.


Type 89. This is the standard type of train on the Kyiv metro. These are completely awesome.

There is one tram route that goes 4 miles through a wood and goes 20 mph the entire way



















In this picture every balcony is different.

I went on a cheap flight adventure to Casablanca and Rabat in Morocco in Africa. This was my first time in Africa, and it is very different to europe. However different you think Africa is, it will me more different than you think!



A complete lack of health and safety on building sites. Look at this scary wooden beam that the workers have to balance on. It has a cable at either end that it is suspended from with hand cranks to move it up and down. This is completely dangerous. There is nothing to steady the platform and it will move around all the time someone is stood on it, and there is nothing to hold on to.



In Morocco all signs are in both French and Arabic.

There are also lots of signs and symbols from France such as this star person stop sign on the tramways.

In Morocco you have to withdraw cash. There are very few shops and most of the time you have to buy things from street sellers.





Both Rabat and Casablanca had a tram system. Both systems used Citadis trams, which was a bit disappointing and they had a very of the shelf feel, rather than being unique.

Morocco has loads of very small streets. There are constant people trying to sell you things. Everyone in Morocco is very outgoing and in your face. Morocco is not a place for quiet reserved people!





I went on a cheap flight adventure to Krakow in Poland. It was interesting, but was not as good as the other Polish cities that I have visited. The shopping centers were a bit mediocre compared to what I have come to expect in Poland. Although the trams in Krakow were very nice.









All the tower blocks I went in had their lifts replaced or modernized which was very disappointing. This tower block had very interesting architecture which has similarities to Woolwich Dockyard architecture in london.






Above: A battery electric bus in Krakow. This bus was nice and fast
